

SCHOOL NOTICE

The health authorities have permitted us to open the public schools next Monday, Nov. 4th. School patrons please take notice that we positively will not admit children who have sore throat, coughs, or who give indications of having fever. We will not admit children who come from homes where any case of sickness has existed and where a physician has not been called. We will not admit children coming from homes which have been quarantined until one week after the quarantine has been lifted and then only on certificate from the attending physician, giving date of recovery of his patients. Teachers will be instructed to make as thorough an examination of their pupils as possible and report all absences on account of sickness of any kind daily to the county health officer. The public school authorities will see to it that no pupil remains in school who is sick or gives the least appearance of sickness.

With Germany and the Influenza Both Whipped What a Joyous Thanksgiving We Will Have This Year

**FEW YANKS NOW
HAVE INFLUENZA.**

Washington, Nov. 2—General March today announced that influenza conditions among troops arriving in France have improved so materially that deaths from the disease practically have stopped. A recent transport convoy carrying 25,000 men arrived at the American port of debarkation, he said, with only 78 cases of influenza.

Regimental units identified and located by General March included the 114th Engineers with the first army west of the Meuse, and the 52nd Pioneer infantry with the fifth army corps in the same territory. These are not part of any division.

General March identified the American forces in Italy as the 332nd battalions 5, 6, 11, 12 and 13, Field hospital 102. In addition, there are certain air service training units.

Spanish Influenza

Germark, at 614 South Fifth street.

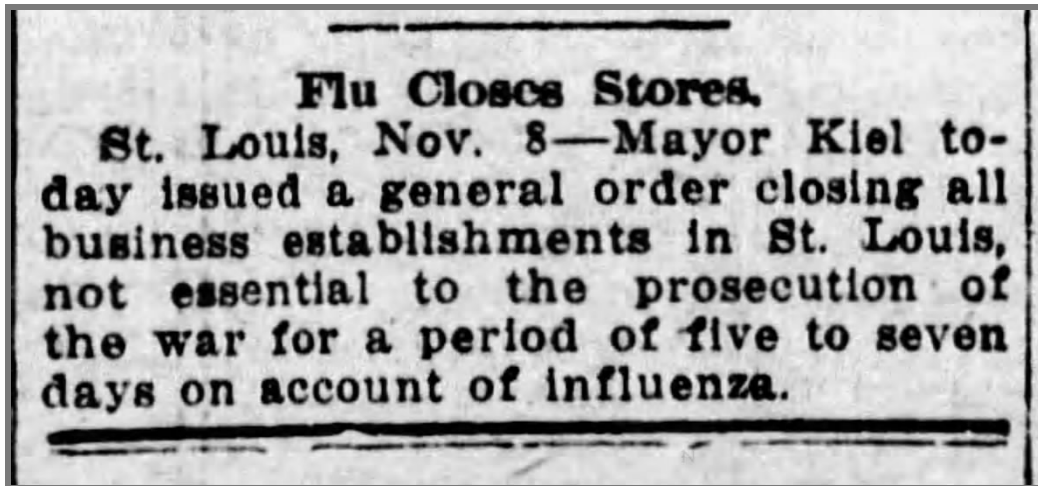



HEALTH TALK

Avoid crowds, coughs and cowards, but fear neither germs nor Germans! Keep the system in good order, take plenty of exercise in the fresh air and practice cleanliness. Remember a clean mouth, a clean skin, and clean bowels are a protecting armour against disease. INFLUENZA CHECKED.

Epidemic Now Wearing Itself Out in Last Section Attacked.

Washington, Nov. 15.—For the first time since Spanish influenza became epidemic in army camps at home, the surgeon general's weekly report shows the disease effectually checked. Figures made public to-day record 6,887 cases for the week ending November 8, as compared with 18,175 the previous week. The epidemic now is wearing itself out in the West, the last section to be affected.

From Raleigh, N. C., Lieutenant Maurice O'Keefe writes his mother, Mrs. C. D. O'Keefe, that he feels some explanation is due his Atchison friends who so loyally worked for him during the late campaign when he was a candidate for county attorney, because he was not here to work for himself. At the time of the campaign, he writes, influenza was rampant at Camp Polk, where he was stationed, and he was detailed to convert a big bare building where there were 500 influenza patients into a clean, sanitary hospital. It was a real job. It was go all day, and night. The building has no conveniences: it was Lieutenant O'Keefe's duty to have them installed. He had to organize nursing forces, sanitary forces, buy supplies, instruct novices in nursing, look after the details when death came; notify relatives, buy coffins, remove the personal belongings of the victim, etc. Every morning at 7 o'clock he was on the job, and still at it at 1 o'clock the next morning. The work told on Lieutenant O'Keefe and he himself had the influenza. But at the hospital, under his direction, the death rate was only 3 per cent, the lowest yet reported. Lieutenant O'Keefe writes: "I felt that my duty to my fellowmen was in this camp, where I did what I could to save lives, instead of at home asking people to vote for me. But I am more appreciative and grateful than I can say for the work done for me by my Atchison kin and friends." Many times explanations do not explain, but Lieutenant Maurice O'Keefe's does.

SPANISH FLU SWEEPS OVER WESTERN KANSAS.

Instead of Abating the Situation is
Becoming Desperate.

Topeka, Nov. 19.—Reports to the state health department assert that the influenza epidemic continues to grow worse in Western Kansas counties and the situation is seriously embarrassing by a general shortage of doctors and nurses. The death on Monday of Mrs. Richard J. Hopkins, of Garden City, wife of the attorney general elect from influenza, was reported here today.

Morton county with but one doctor is in the worst stages of the epidemic. A telegram from Elkhart to Governor Capper appealed for state medical aid and stated that 80 new cases broke out there in one day. According to the state health department, counties in the western third of the state have on an average of but about four doctors each.

State Teachers' Convention May Be Postponed This Year.

Topeka, Nov. 19.—Officers and directors of the State Teachers' association discussed postponement of the annual convention recently re-set for November 28, 29 and 30, at a meeting held today at the office of State Superintendent W. R. Ross.

The state board of health has recommended postponement of the convention on account of the influenza epidemic. Final decision, awaiting telegraph replies from directors who were not at today's meeting, will be announced tomorrow.

"It looks as though the convention will be called off for this year," said Superintendent Ross after the meeting.

According to a letter received recently by Dr. Robert L. Patterson, pastor of St. Mark's Lutheran church, from his brother in Durham, N. C., influenza caused many deaths there during the recent epidemic. The quarantine was rigidly enforced. Two men engaged in a fist fight and a crowd collected. The police immediately arrested not only the men but the crowd that collected, because they had violated the quarantine order against public gatherings.

Death from pneumonia, following influenza, called Mrs. John McFarland this morning at 4 o'clock at her home 2½ miles southeast of Effingham, after a short illness. The deceased was one of Atchison county's finest women. Her husband and one son, Paul, the only one at home, are ill with influenza. Mrs. McFarland was born in Bakersville, Coshocton county, O., 60 years ago and was married there to Mr. McFarland. They came to Kansas 30 years ago, and since that time Mrs. McFarland had lived in the vicinity of Effingham and Monrovia. She is survived by her husband and four sons: Freeman, of Washington, Kas.; Blake, who is on his way to France, and Ernest, in France. She also is survived by a step-mother, Mrs. Andrew Hawk, of Effingham, and by five half brothers and two half sisters. The funeral will be at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon from the home, burial in Effingham cemetery.
